EXHIBITION: East of Eden is a large-scale exhibition exploring different aspects of the relationship of society to nature, through contemporary art. The exhibition presents work by sixty artists, with forty-one selected through a process of national open submission (selectors: Clive Adams [Centre for Contemporary Art & the Natural World], Susan Derges [artist], Peter Fend [Ocean Earth Development Corporation] and the Spacex Co-Directors) and nineteen invited artists. The exhibition addresses a wide range of issues relating to the environment, from the re-presentation of nature to ecological strategies for social change. Particular themes include the current crisis in farming, the relationship of humans to animals, land use and notions of territory, the exploitation and manipulation of nature, climate change, and everyday domestic uses of the idea of nature, as well as reflection upon what it is to be a part of nature, the sense of time passing and the re-presentation of embodied experience.

In the Western tradition we are all children of the farmer. Cain killed his nomadic brother, Abel, and henceforth our relation to the land has been sedentary and territorial. East of Eden it seems that we are condemned to endlessly re-construct idealised models of Nature so that we might possess it, as if the microcosms we create are somehow removed from the society we live in. But if the 'natural world' is everything that exists beyond human intervention then we can never know it directly. Our experience of nature is always mediated through culture and history. Ultimately the only object in exploring the idea of nature must therefore be to examine the processes of its cultural production, and thus to reflect back upon society's uses of such a re-presentation. Just as it is impossible to regain the innocence of childhood there can be no return to Eden, but the collective desire for a 'lost paradise' remains a powerful social dynamic. Whether we are to harness it as a force for change, to arrest the human destruction of the environment, or continue to allow it to be used as a tool for the maintenance of basic social hierarchies is the choice we face. East of Eden is thus an exhibition that explores not only the re-presentation of nature but also the nature of re-presentation.
